Overview:

Sites and Experiences:

- Bullet Train (Shinkansen) travels at speeds around 180 mph
- Kyoto to celebrate the New Year
- Baseball practice with a Japanese team

Words, Phrases and Sayings Learned:

- Konnichiwa = Hello
- Kudasai = Please
- *Sofu* = Grandfather (your grandfather)
- *Ojii-san* = Grandfather (someone else's grandfather)
- Shogatsu = New Year's Day

Customs Learned:

- Bowing is a sign of respect
- Removing shoes and wearing guest slippers when entering a home is a sign of respect
- Wiping your hands with a warm moist towel before eating
- Using chopsticks to eat food

• Slurping noodles is polite and shows you are enjoying your meal

Foods Eaten:

- Mochi = Sticky rice cakes
- Ramen = Noodle dish served in broth

Activity:

Class Research:

- GROUP 1: Research what the Bullet Train looks like and find its fastest speed.
- GROUP 2: Research the origins of some popular Japanese customs such as bowing and removing shoes in a home.
- GROUP 3: Research some popular Japanese foods and their ingredients.
- GROUP 4: Research the different rules between Japanese and American baseball.

Materials:

• Poster board, markers, crayons

Get your poster board ready and divide it into four sections. Have each group depict their research onto the poster board. Hang it next to your Australia poster. Your mural must be getting long by now – I bet it's beautiful!

Additional activities:

- Try some simple *origami* (the traditional Japanese art of paper folding). There are many shapes that can be made. Start simple and work up to more difficult folds. The internet offers several instruction pages and videos that can help you get started.
- Since flying a kite is an important part of celebrating the Japanese New Year (Shogatsu), gather
 materials and instructions to make simple diamond shaped kites. Children can put words and
 pictures on the kite depicting things they learned about Japan. Search web pages for instructions
 and videos to help you get started.



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
